Chairman's Report

As we celebrate our 80th Anniversary, our thoughts naturally return to our founder, Mrs Alice Street, who established the London Flower Lovers League in 1945. In the austere post-war years, her vision to encourage schoolchildren to grow bulbs was both inspirational and profoundly hopeful.

In 1948 she launched the Society's first competition, growing daffodils to foster an early interest in gardening. That simple idea remains central to our work today through our spring bulb competition and wider seasonal growing activities.

Beyond her horticultural vision, Alice Street was instrumental in giving the Society stature and lasting influence. Through our original link with the London Garden Society, she helped secure our first Patron, HRH The Queen, later to become Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth The Queen Mother. Significantly, Her Majesty continued as our Patron even after the Society formally separated from the London Garden Society, a testament both to Alice's personal influence and to the value placed upon the Society's work.

This proud tradition of Patronage continued after her death with the appointment of The Countess of Wessex, now HRH The Duchess of Edinburgh, as our Patron. It is a legacy of leadership, advocacy and continuity for which Alice deserves particular recognition, and one that continues to enhance the standing and reach of the Society today.

Over the years, London schools have participated enthusiastically in our competitions, expanding the original concept into a broad educational programme. I am sure our founder would be proud to know that the Society continues to introduce the magic of horticulture to schools across London.

Our annual awards presentation at Guildhall, often attended by our President Alan Titchmarsh and representatives of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, remains a highlight of the year, with trophies presented to 27 schools and some 200 young participants.

The success of our programme depends upon careful organisation. Our Administrator coordinates our voluntary judges, while results are diligently managed by our Director, ensuring the smooth running of our competitions.

To mark our 80th Anniversary, the Society plans to launch several new funding initiatives, with winners to be presented at the 2026 Presentation Event. The Society remains firmly committed to our founder's vision, and we are deeply grateful to our Committee members, sponsors and donors for their continued support.

It is a great pleasure as Chairman to celebrate this important milestone, and I am confident the Society will continue to flourish, inspiring future generations through our competitions.

Director's Report

2025 marks a significant milestone as we celebrate the Society's 80th anniversary. To commemorate this, we hosted a Garden Party at Lullingstone Castle in September, where Tom Hart-Dyke led guests on an engaging tour of the World Garden he created, followed by an inspiring talk.

Despite ongoing funding challenges faced by small charities, we successfully delivered all core activities this year. While our budget ended in deficit, the commitment of our supporters ensured uninterrupted programmes. Rising operational costs, including increased staff pay due to National Minimum Wage uplifts and higher postage and utilities expenses, remain a challenge. We are deeply grateful to our donors, particularly the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, whose grant allowed us to offer additional discounts on bulb and seed orders, contributing to increased school entries for the Spring and Summer Competitions.

The Annual Award Ceremony at the London Guildhall was a highlight, with prizes presented by our President Alan Titchmarsh CBE and Alderman Robert Howard, Master of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners.

We were saddened by the passing of Janet Gotch, a long-standing committee member and devoted supporter, whose warmth and dedication will be greatly missed. Many Society representatives attended her funeral to pay respects.

This year also marked the conclusion of our Planting in the Playground project. In honour of our anniversary, we are developing new initiatives inviting schools to apply for funding for innovative gardening projects, fostering a love of horticulture among young people.

I extend sincere thanks to all our donors (see page 8), especially the Patrick & Helena Frost Foundation for their continued generosity. My heartfelt gratitude also goes to our staff, volunteers, friends, and committee members, your dedication underpins all that we achieve.

Spring Bulb Competition

Entries for the 2025 Spring Bulb Competition saw a welcome increase, with 78 schools taking part compared with 71 last year. Just over 9,500 bulbs were sold, and there was a notable rise in orders for pots and vases, which grew from 1,200 to 3,200. This year, we were also delighted to donate £390 worth of free bulbs, made possible through a generous grant from the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, along with free postage on all school orders. The Society extends its sincere thanks to all participating schools and especially to the children, teachers, and staff, for their enthusiasm and commitment to this year's competition.

Summer and School Garden Competitions

Participation in the 2025 Summer and School Garden Competitions continued to grow, with 112 schools taking part compared with 104 last year. This year, we supplied 4,200 packets of seeds to participating schools, with sunflower seeds once again proving to be the most

popular choice. We were also delighted to donate £1,120 worth of free seeds, made possible again through a generous grant from the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, alongside free postage on all school orders. The Society extends its sincere thanks to all our volunteers, who generously gave their time to visit schools, judge the children's work, and provide valuable feedback. Their dedication remains essential to the success of these competitions.

Trophy Ceremony

The 2025 Trophy Ceremony was held in the Livery Hall at the Guildhall, and we extend our sincere thanks to the Chief Commoner, the Lady Mayor, and the Remembrancer's Office for kindly granting us the use of this magnificent venue.

Twenty-seven winning schools attended this year's celebration, where awards were presented by our President, Alan Titchmarsh CBE, and Master Gardener Alderman Robert Howard. The *Volunteer of the Year* award was presented to long-standing judge Penny Pockock, in recognition of her many years of dedicated service, including visiting schools and judging on behalf of the Society.

We would also like to offer special thanks to representatives from The Royal Parks for showcasing their activities and contributing to the success of the event.

Design our Annual Report Front Cover Competition

In the autumn term, we launched the 2025 Front Cover Competition, inviting schoolchildren across London to create the design for this year's Annual Report cover. The response was outstanding, with hundreds of entries submitted, making the judging process both exciting and challenging.

We are delighted to announce that the overall winner is *Fasiya Enayathulla*, aged 8, from Uphall Primary School in Ilford. Fasiya's vibrant and imaginative design is proudly featured on the front cover of this report and is also available to view on our website.

London Children's Flower Society Friends' Group

As already noted, 2025 marked the 80th anniversary of our charity, founded by Alice Street from her home in Orpington, before the Society later established its office in Orpington High Street, premises that we continue to occupy today. Although the Friends Group has a shorter history, having been established a decade ago, it plays a vital role in recognising and supporting our dedicated volunteer judges and supporters of LCFS. I would like to extend my sincere thanks to them all, and in particular to Friends Group Administrator, Natalie.

To mark this special anniversary year, we held a garden party at the World Garden at Lullingstone, which included a guided tour led by Tom Hart Dyke, who shared fascinating insights into the origins and development of the garden. This was followed by refreshments in the marquee, kindly provided by the World Garden staff, and a splendid cake to commemorate our 80th anniversary. Although not all Friends were able to attend, the event was well supported despite the unseasonably poor weather. Once again, this occasion would not have been possible without the excellent behind-the-scenes organisation by Emma and Natalie.

The year concluded with our Trophy Ceremony at the Guildhall, where we were delighted to welcome our President, Alan Titchmarsh, and the Master of the Worshipful Company of Gardeners, Robert Howard, who presented prizes to the many enthusiastic children, together with their teachers and school helpers.

Members will recall that last year the Friends Group visited Coolings Garden Centre in Knockholt, Kent, where we enjoyed an informative tour led by Ian Hazon, Production and Operations Director. We are now pleased to welcome Ian as a member of our Executive Committee, and we greatly value the experience and horticultural knowledge he brings. Coolings has long been a most supportive partner of the Society.

We are currently considering arrangements for the 2026 Friends Group meeting and will announce the venue in due course. We look forward to 2026 and to your continued support and we hope to see you again soon.

Financial Report 2025

The Society continues to rely on the generosity of our donors, and we remain deeply grateful to all who support our work. Their contributions enable us to provide London schoolchildren with opportunities to learn about horticulture and to enhance their local environments through our annual spring and summer competitions.

For the year ended 31 August 2025, total incoming resources were £26,294, a decrease from the prior year (2024: £43,699). This reduction reflects the significant legacy income received in the previous year. Donations and legacies amounted to £18,055, with £2,900 relating to restricted funds. Interest received increased to £2,310, reflecting improved deposit conditions.

Expenditure for the year totalled £32,812 (2024: £31,716). Of this, £26,485 related to charitable activities, including our spring and summer competitions, and £4,662 to costs of generating voluntary income. Governance expenditure amounted to £1,665. The resulting net movement in funds is a deficit of £6,518, leaving year-end total funds available of £55,908.

School engagement remains strong: in 2025, certificates were awarded in 186 schools, and 27 Gold Award winners were recognised at our Annual Award Ceremony at the London Guildhall. Our work is supported by a team of volunteer judges, whose time and dedication remain vital to the success of our competitions.

Reserves continue to be managed prudently. The Society holds sufficient unrestricted funds to operate for approximately 18 months, maintaining resilience in the face of financial uncertainties.

This year marks our 80th Anniversary, a milestone celebrated at a Garden Party held at the Lullingstone World Garden in September 2025. We remain grateful for the continued support of donors and volunteers, whose contributions ensure that the Society can inspire young people and foster a lifelong appreciation of the natural world.

History

- The London Flower Lovers League was established in 1945, shortly after the Second World War, as an offshoot of the London Gardens Society. Founded by Mrs. Alice Street, its first Chairman for 17 years, the organisation set out to inspire a love of gardening among London's children.
- One of its earliest initiatives was a city-wide daffodil competition, open to all London schools. Children were encouraged to grow bulbs in pots, on windowsills, or anywhere with good light, with medallions and certificates awarded for their efforts.
- Following the death of Alice Street in 1966, operations moved from her home to new premises in Orpington, where the Society continues to be based. In 1967, a plaque was installed in Peckham Rye Park in her memory, and the League was formally registered as a charity.
- In 1975, the organisation adopted its current name: The London Children's Flower Society.
- The daffodil competition grew rapidly, at one point distributing up to 100,000 bulbs each autumn. Volunteers would then judge the children's flowers each spring. Due to increasing demand, a summer competition was later introduced, initially featuring nasturtiums and candytuft and eventually expanding to include a wide range of annuals, vegetables, and herbs that flower or fruit during the school term.
- As schools sought recognition for their wider gardening efforts, a dedicated garden competition was also launched.
- In 1990, the Society faced the threat of closure following the abolition of the Inner London Education Authority and the loss of its £11,000 grant. Since then, funding has been sustained through annual fundraising, supported primarily by charitable trusts, private donors, and grant-making bodies.
- Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Queen Mother served as Patron until her passing in 2002. In 2004, HRH The Duchess of Edinburgh became Patron, continuing the tradition of visiting schools and presenting awards on behalf of the Society.
